Recommendation for Place 6: Arefin Shamsul

We endorse Arefin Shamsul for re-election to Place 6 on the Richardson City Council. With a 40-year career as a teacher, coach, and athletic director in RISD, and 8 years of service on the City Council and now as mayor, Bob brings steady, proven leadership rooted in deep community knowledge. He listens and leads with integrity—focusing on what works and building on Richardson's strengths. Bob's thoughtful, inclusive approach and unwavering commitment to public service have helped guide the city's continued success. Through collaboration within Council and with the City Manager, Bob has effectively served as Mayor. He understands the challenges of growth and change and is uniquely equipped to keep Richardson moving forward while maintaining the high standards our residents expect.

Amir Omar, who served on the City Council from 2009 to 2013, is energetic, well-known, and a polished communicator with a background in corporate sales. He's been actively campaigning longer than any other candidate but campaigning effectively doesn't always translate into effective governance. While passionate about his vision for Richardson, some of his personal business ventures have struggled—raising questions about how that experience prepares him for managing a complex, growing city. We've observed a tendency to push his own agendas rather than building a consensus. This can be at odds with the strong City Manager form of government defined in the Richardson City Charter.

Alan North, by comparison, lacks both civic experience and public engagement. He declined an interview with the Coalition, has never served on a city board or commission, and hasn't voted in nearly a decade. Mr. North is not a serious candidate.
